Established in 1966, Arena is one of Australia's longestrunning producers of theatre for young people. Arena's work has represented and reflected the changing lives and imaginations of young people.

From our home in Bendigo, Arena conducts its artistic research by collaborating with young people from all over the Central Goldfields region.

We know that our work has a powerful impact on children and young people because they tell us, their teachers tell us, their parents tell us, and academics who study our work tell us. Above all, we know our work has a powerful impact because we see it with our own eyes.

The world we share isn't a simple one. It can be a world of challenges, differences, injustices and contradictions. Through theatre, we are able to explore these topics in ways that are revealing, empowering and entertaining.



About Robot Song

When eleven-year-old Juniper May receives a petition signed by her entire class stating that she is 'the most hated person in the school' her life is thrown into turmoil. She stops eating, refuses to return to school and her parents become increasingly desperate. Finally, her parents' resort to the only thing they have left, a giant singing robot.

Based on a true story, Robot Song illustrates the profound, transformative nature of creativity that when combined with unconditional love, becomes an unstoppable force. For Juniper, creativity opens doors into places she never knew existed allowing her, for the first time, to be defined on her own terms.

Robot Song is a deeply personal story. It shares an honest, intensely funny and often unconventional window into writer, director Jolyon James' experience parenting a child on the Autism Spectrum. The show poses, and attempts to answer the question 'how do we support, foster and celebrate difference in our children in the face of an increasingly rigid and homogenised world?'

Robot Song is a genuine family show. It is joyful and full of hope. It is for any child who has ever felt isolated and any parent who is desperate for tools to help. The show employs cutting edge digital technology, startling animatronics and a beautiful original musical score.

These notes have been designed to help prepare young people aged 8 – 12 years to see the Robot Song and then afterwards dive deeper into the ideas the show raises. Robot Song can be used as a provocation for any/all of the following Australian Curriculum areas:

- English
- Personal and social capability
- Critical and creative thinking

JUNIPER MAY

An eleven year old girl, also known as Junee, Pixel and a heap of other names. Juniper also plays the Principal Mr Scryber.



DAD

Juniper's Dad, an artist. Dad also plays Miss Cummings, Miss Hope, the classmates and Battletac



THE MUSICIAN

Although in the video version the musician doesn't speak, he is playing all the music that brings Robot Song to life.

MUM

The character of Mum is never seen on stage but we hear her voice coming from backstage.

MISS CUMMINGS

Juniper's art teacher, played by Dad.

PRINCIPAL SCRYBER

Principal of Juniper's school, played by Juniper.

GOMI

A large industrial recycling bin. Gomi means rubbish in Japanese.

BATTLETAC

A famous giant robot from the 1980's, performed and operated by Dad.
